## RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

1 All classes are open to the Island and all paid-up members of our Society.

2 The entry fee for each entry is 20 p. There is no entrance fee for children's classes.

3 Entry forms must be delivered to the Show Secretary as stipulated on the entry form. Exhibitors may only stage one exhibit in each class. Late entries will not be accepted.

4 All exhibits must be staged by 10.00am and removed no earlier than 5.00 pm on the day of the Show. Exhibits may also be staged after 6.00pm the evening before at your own risk.

5 Vases, dishes and plates will be provided by the Society.
6 All cauliflowers and cabbages to show 2 inches ( 5 cm ) of clear stem; all soft fruit should be shown with stems and haulms.

7 A person must not show any fruit, flowers or vegetables which he/she has not grown in his/her garden, (excluding flower arrangements). Pot plants must have been the property of the exhibitor at least two months before the Show. The Committee may view the gardens of exhibitors if they consider it advisable to do so.

8 Items of craft must have been made by the exhibitor.
$9 \quad$ All exhibitors except those on duty shall leave the tent before the judging starts, and shall not be admitted again until the tent is open to the public.

10 The judges may withhold any prize at their discretion or refuse to award any prize if the exhibit is deemed to not have sufficient merit. In awarding prizes the decisions of the judges shall be final.

11 Any exhibitor attempting deception, if it be proved to the satisfaction of the Committee, will forfeit all claim to any prize and be debarred from showing at the next Show.

12 Any exhibitor wishing to enter a protest can do so in writing on the day of the Show to the Show Secretary (who will lay the protest before the Committee) and by depositing the sum of $£ 1$ with her. If the protest is not sustained the money will be paid into Society funds. If it is upheld the money will be returned to the exhibitor.

13 Exhibitors are asked to name horticultural exhibits where possible.

14 All horticultural exhibits will be judged under R.H.S. rules.
15 A person must not show any exhibit in Sections 8 and 9 which has been shown before at Chillerton and Gatcombe Show.

16 All liqueur is to be exhibited in a clear bottle.
17 All food entries to be covered with cling film or similar by the exhibitor.

## Recipe for "Victorian fruit cake" for class 90

| $4 \mathrm{oz} / 115 \mathrm{~g}$ butter, | $4 \mathrm{oz} / 115 \mathrm{~g}$ caster sugar, | 2 eggs, |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| $1 / 4$ pint $/ 150 \mathrm{ml}$ milk, | $8 \mathrm{zz} / 225 \mathrm{~g}$ self-raising flour, |  |
| $12 \mathrm{oz} / 350 \mathrm{~g}$ mixed dried fruit, | $2 \mathrm{oz} / 50 \mathrm{~g}$ chopped mixed peel, |  |
| Pinch salt, | $2 \mathrm{oz} / 50 \mathrm{~g}$ chopped glace cherries, |  |
| 1 level teaspoon mixed spice |  |  |

Preheat the oven to $160 \mathrm{C} / 325 \mathrm{~F} /$ Gas Mark 3.
Cream the butter and sugar, then add the lightly beaten eggs.
Fold in the fruit, followed by the flour, spice and salt.
Add enough milk to make a soft dropping consistency.
Spoon into a round, greased and lined 6 inch $/ 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ cake tin and bake for $1 \frac{1}{2}$ to $13 / 4$ hours or until golden brown and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out cleanly.
Leave for 30 minutes before turning onto a wire rack to cool down.
